Levine Act - To promote transparency and fairness in government decision-making, the Levine Act imposes contribution prohibitions and disclosure requirements. Specifically, any elected or appointed City officer is prohibited from making or attempting to influence a decision in a proceeding involving a license, permit, or other entitlement for use if the officer received a contribution of more than \$500 within the preceding 12 months from a party or their agent. (Gov. Code § 84308(c)(1).) Additionally, parties to proceedings involving a license, permit, or other entitlement for use pending before any elected or appointed City officer must disclose any campaign contributions exceeding \$500 that they made within the preceding 12 months. 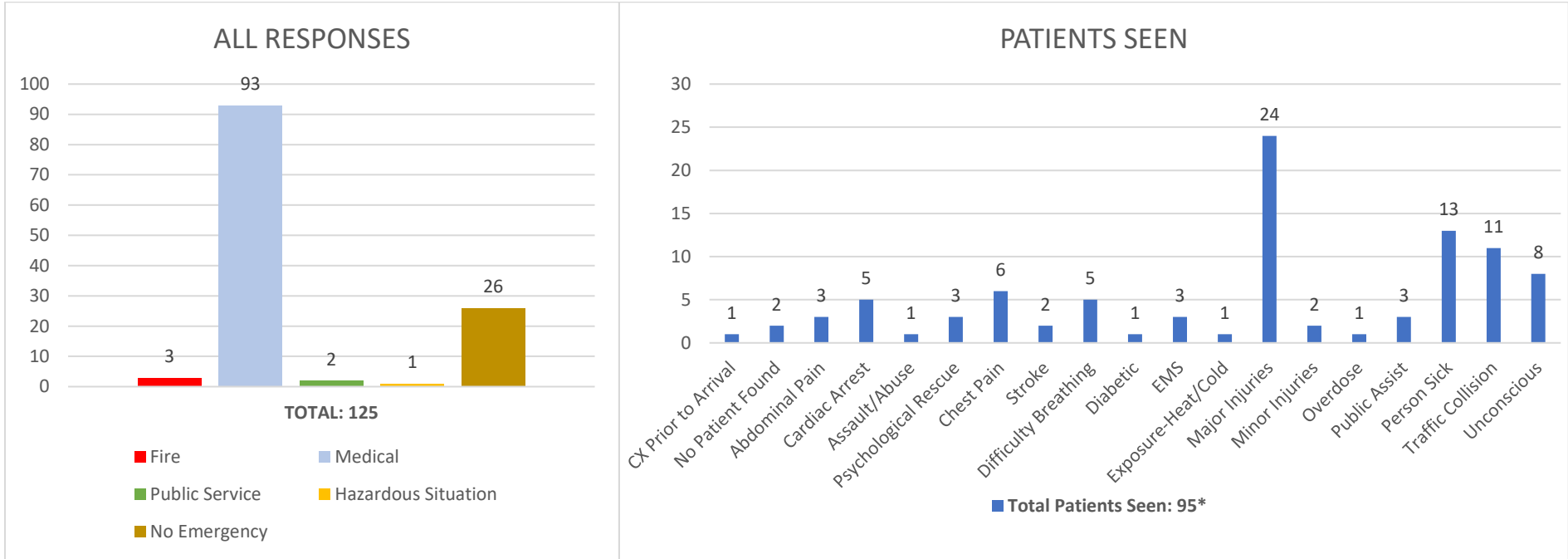

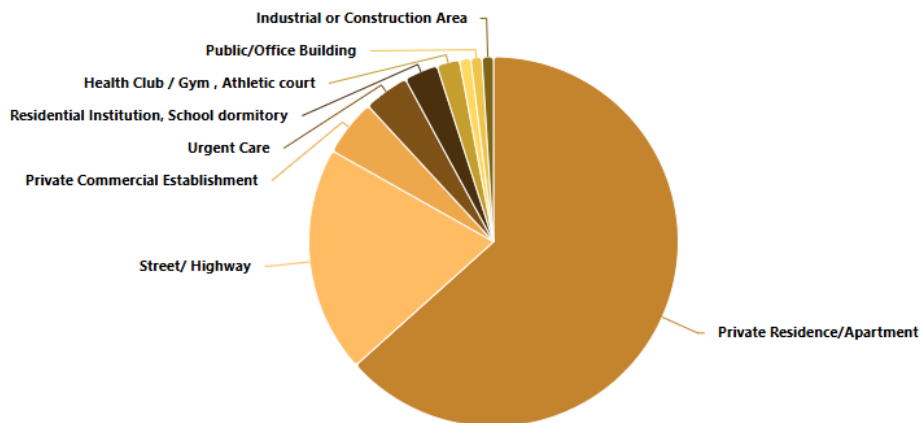

SAFETY TIP OF THE MONTH:

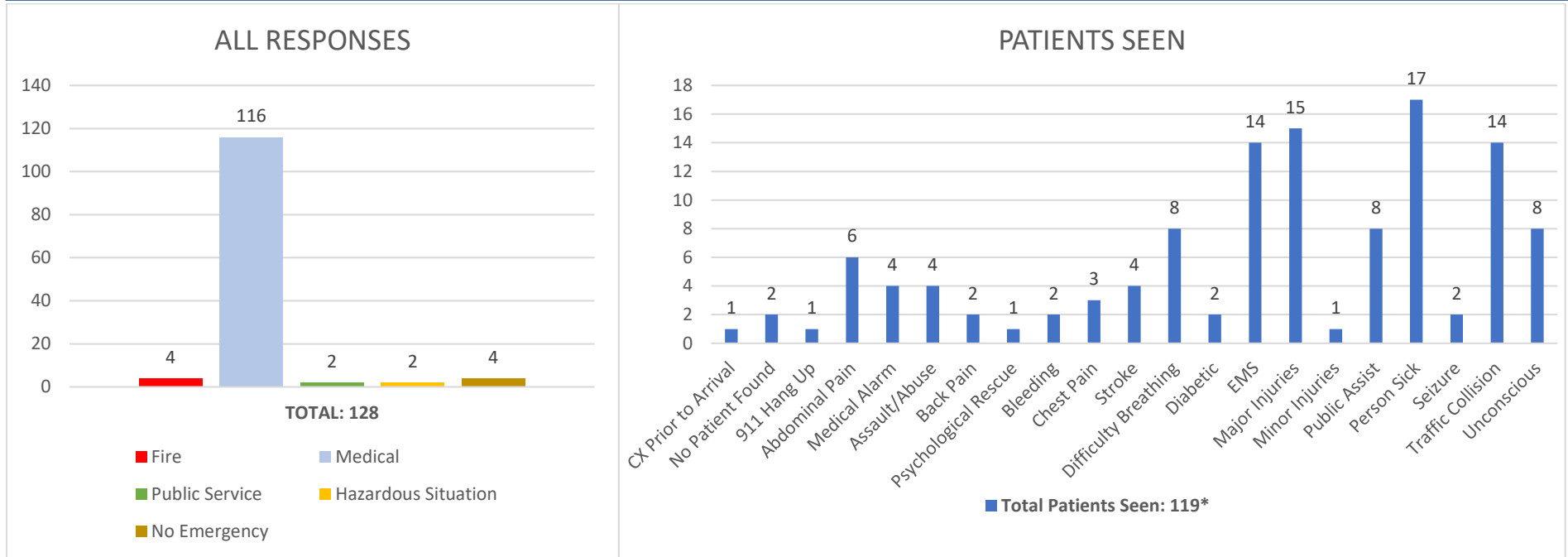

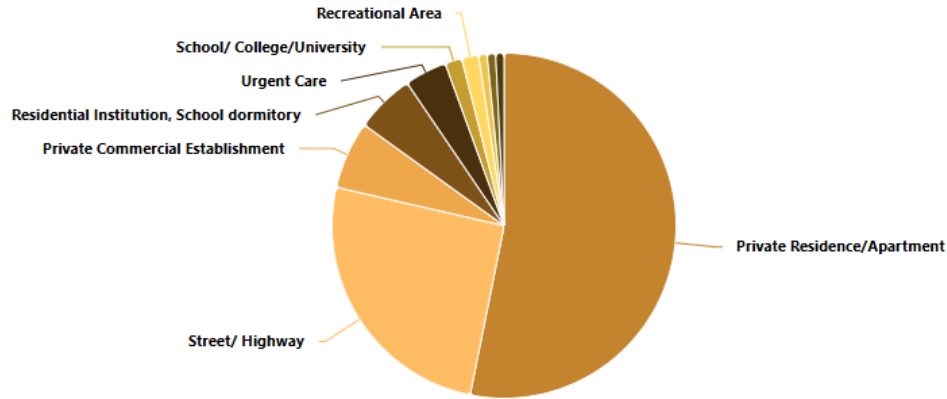

NOTEWORTHY INCIDENTS

2/15/26	Public Service	4601 Alta Canyon Road	Gas leak detected by Gas Company representative. Fire and Gas Co personnel each took readings, with nothing detected before leaving scene. Gas was shut off, but safe for residents to remain. Advised for gas to remain off until residents called for repairs to the leak. FD assisted in ventilating the home as well.
2/16/26	Public Service	733 Craig Avenue	Responded to call of wires down; determined to be communication lines, not power. Lines were then cut so as not to interfere with vehicles on the road; notifications made for repairs.

SAFETY TIP OF THE MONTH:

Carbon monoxide (CO) is known as the “silent killer” because it is an odorless, tasteless gas that cannot be seen. CO poisoning can result from faulty furnaces or other heating appliances, clothes dryers, or cars left running in garages. Some symptoms of CO poisoning include headaches, nausea, and drowsiness. Exposure to undetected high levels of CO can be fatal. To avoid CO poisoning:

- Ensure all fuel-burning vented equipment is vented to the outside.
- Keep the venting for exhaust clear and unblocked.
- Do not leave your car running in the garage, even if the garage doors are open.

Background:

Firewise USA provides a flexible, community-driven framework to help residents understand wildfire risk and take coordinated action to reduce vulnerabilities. Participating communities receive education, technical guidance, and national recognition. The program is voluntary and emphasizes local leadership and resident engagement rather than regulation.

Staff is presenting the Firewise USA Community Program to the Commission to explain its purpose, highlight potential community benefits, and propose a phased approach to assist local implementation.

Discussion/Analysis:

The Firewise community program provides a structured, community-based approach to improving wildfire resilience in California by encouraging collaboration among residents, local fire departments, and other partners. To receive Firewise recognition, participating residential areas with a minimum of eight and a maximum of 2,500 dwelling units form a resident-led Firewise committee and complete a community wildfire risk assessment in coordination with wildfire professionals. Based on that assessment, the group develops and implements a multi-year action plan focused on education, mitigation, and defensible space. Annual participation is maintained through documented volunteer and mitigation activities and yearly reporting to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) for continued recognition.

A community's participation in Firewise USA demonstrates a proactive, organized approach to wildfire preparedness and risk reduction. This level of engagement is often viewed favorably when state or federal agencies evaluate applications for wildfire safety, vegetation management, or fuel-reduction grants, particularly when funding is limited. In addition, California's "Safer from Wildfires" regulations require insurance companies to recognize Firewise USA designated communities by providing discounts to property owners within those community boundaries.

While Firewise USA is a resident-led program, the City can support participation in several ways and help ensure neighborhoods have the necessary resources for successful implementation. City involvement would focus on coordination and education, while preserving the community-driven

nature of the program.

- **Education and Awareness:** Develop and share public-facing educational materials, and identify helpful resources for interested neighborhoods.
- **Local and State Partnerships:** Coordinate with local fire agencies and state or regional wildfire experts who may serve as advisors or representatives on a community's Firewise Board or Committee, providing technical guidance and best practices.

This approach allows groups within the community to participate in the Firewise Program with City support, strengthens consistency and program success, and reinforces wildfire preparedness efforts across the community.

Background:

Property crime, including burglary, remains a concern for residents and business owners in La Cañada Flintridge. There are several effective strategies that can help reduce risk and improve security. These can include reinforcing vulnerable entry points like doors and windows, installing protective measures such as anti-burglary window film, or securing mailboxes with locks. Because burglars often look for easy access, taking a layered approach with multiple preventative measures can significantly deter criminal activity and enhance overall safety.

Discussion/Analysis:

For FY 26-27, City Council approved \$15,000 in funding to establish a Home Anti-Burglary Protection Program aimed at helping residents and businesses in La Cañada Flintridge strengthen their properties against burglary. The program is intended to support proactive crime prevention by reducing financial barriers to security improvements that can help deter property crime.

The proposed program would operate on a reimbursement basis, providing financial assistance to eligible property owners for approved security-related purchases and installations. Potential eligible improvements may include items such as anti-burglary window film, locking mailboxes, reinforced locks, and other security measures designed to enhance property protection. As the program moves into development, staff is seeking input from the Public Safety Commission regarding potential eligibility criteria and qualifying security improvements. Commission feedback will help establish the framework for which purchases and installations should be considered eligible for reimbursement and ensure the program reflects community needs and priorities.

Following Commission direction, staff will work collaboratively with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department to further refine the program, including validating eligible security measures against law enforcement best practices and developing final program guidelines. Staff will then return to the Public Safety Commission with a finalized program proposal for review and recommendation prior to implementation.
